People Youngest-ever Olympic equestrian to perform

Luiza Tavares de Almeida, 17, became the youngest-ever Olympic equestrian at age 16. * when she competed with the possible, completes her studies Brazilian team in dressage at the 2008 Olympics. Almeida said she was amazed when she made the Brazilian Olympic team by competing in the Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro. The team received the bronze medal and a spot to compete in the Olympics.

"I wasn't supposed to compete-that day and had 24-hour notice to prepare," she said. "I was the last rider to ride; it was amazing and beyond words."

During her trip to the Olympics many of the other riders were at least 10 years older than her. But it didn't worry Almeida.

I try to stay on the confident side," she said. Almeida shows maturity dur-

ing her competitions, but she and the second second

also is a typical teenager. She practices twice a day for about 1 to 1 ½ hours. Although she travels, practices and competes, Almeida said she leads a normal life. She attends school when and socializes with nonriding friends like any other teenager.

She has been competing for five years in dressage, but has been riding horses since she began jumping at age 2. Almeida and her horse Samba have a strong bond that has been developed over the years.

"We were both young when we started dressage; I was 12 and he was 3," she said. "We have grown together in dressage; I've been with him five years."

Almeida is competing in dressage during the Winter Equestrian Festival. It is her first visit to Florida and she said she has enjoyed competing in the United States.

"I enjoy the amount of competitors here," she said. "There are more competitors here in the USA than in Brazil and Europe.'

Almeida said she is excited about her presentation during the 2009 Lusitano Collection® Auction Thursday in which she will lead the Showcase Parade of Horses and perform her free-
